Montessori said that children aged 6-12 are moral explorers really wanting to know why certain rules exist and also wanting to explore what those rules mean.

- Reinforcing the importance of using the THINK acronym including when speaking to the teacher.

WHAT ARE THE MONTESSORI GREAT STORIES?

We have recently been focusing on the Fourth Great Montessori Story, which looks at communication through signs. This story traces how humans learned to write down ideas and serves as a starting point for studying grammar, inventions, and the contributions of many civilizations to writing.

The Five Great Lessons (some traditions include six) are impressionistic "windows" into the world that help children see the bigger picture—of both the universe and the Montessori curriculum. They are a central part of Montessori classrooms. Montessori believed that stories are an essential way to awaken a child's imagination.

Each story is traditionally told by a teacher and accompanied by props or experiments to illustrate key ideas. They are usually presented to the whole class.

THE FIRST GREAT LESSON – The Coming of the Universe

This story introduces students to the formation of the universe, stars, the solar system, and the beginnings of Earth.

THE SECOND GREAT LESSON - Life Comes to Earth

This story introduces students to the earliest life forms and explains how they adapted to Earth's changing conditions. It explores the diversity of life and ends just before humans appeared.

THE THIRD GREAT LESSON - The Coming of Humans

This story explores the arrival of humans on Earth and what makes humanity unique.

THE FOURTH GREAT LESSON – Communication in Signs

This story explains how humans developed systems of writing to communicate ideas (discussed above).

THE FIFTH GREAT LESSON - The Story of Numbers

This story traces the origins of mathematics and the human invention of numbers.
